My company started in 1999 in a garage. We decided to license our technology, but this was not easy because most implementers adopted efficient infringement strategies, which are today known as "patent hold-out strategies". What saved us from bankruptcy were our strong patents.

















SMEs need to have access to IP rights and know how to use them effectively. And IP rights must be enforceable when infringement happens. Without that, they are useless. As a priority, we should continue to work to create a level playing field, to help SMEs to be able to enforce their IP rights on the ground.

The current fragmentation of IP in Europe entails high costs that are hard for small companies like ours to bear.







Concerted engagement to support European SMEs will be critically important, and the IP Action Plan is a solid foundation.















Less than 10% of European SMEs are using IP rights, so action is needed. First, awareness. European SMEs are often unaware of the benefits of integrating IP management into their businesses. But awareness is not enough. SMEs need the correct information at the right time, the right resources and knowledge. They also need support and assistance to be fully empowered in their journey to use IP protections.

The IP Action plan addresses some extremely important issues for SMEs. For example, it is critical to develop a financing system that can really accept patents and other IP as a form of collateral. The value of IP should show up in SMEs' financial statements so that funding is possible, as is the case with other asset categories.
